# Fry Words I-400 Organized by Syllable Type

#### Tip #1: Keep the big picture in mind!

Remember how words are mapped onto the brain for long-term, effortless retrieval. **Orthographic mapping** is the term describing the mechanism of learning that forms the 'memory' of a word (see research from Dr. Linnea Ehri and insights from David Kilpatrick). Help your students **build the capacity** for mapping words! Trying to memorize one word at a time has a short shelf life.

#### Tip #2: Build the capacity to map words into long-term memory.

Remember there are 2 requisite skills necessary for the development of orthographic mapping. Watch the webinar for more detailed information.

- 1. Phonemic Proficiency- This is a form of phonemic awareness that goes **beyond the ability** to blend phonemes (sounds) and segment phonemes within words. Phonemic proficiency describes an ability to **manipulate** phonemes at **an advanced level**.
- 2. Letter sound knowledge- A strong phonics base is necessary for mapping words into long term memory.

#### Tip #3: Train those sight words differently!

This list is organized by syllable type (as best as possible). You will see that not every word is a perfect fit for the syllable type I placed it in. Feel free to make adjustments as you see fit. Here are a few ideas for using this list with struggling readers.

- 1. Introduce the Fry words by syllable type alongside your phonics instruction. In this way, you will be tackling 2 things at once: phonics development AND high frequency word recognition. Use these words in flashcard games and replace your typical sight words games with Fry words by syllable type.
- 2. Do not feel the need to stay within the confines of a single list. Of course, as teachers, we are often assessing a student's knowledge within a specific list, but if you are looking for words to use in games for phonics practice, get your ideas right from the Fry word list by syllable type and go beyond the specific list you are using at your grade level.
